Which of these are absolute contraindications to MRI?


- A. Orthopedic hardware of any kind?

It's the same with pregnancy and radiation. If a woman gets irradiated due to a radiograph or a CT scan around the time of conception or within 2-3 weeks thereafter, there is often a lot of confusion about what to do. Similarly, if a 30-weeks old pregnant patient needs a CT pulmonary angiogram, things unnecessarily go into a loop.
